Treasure City Death & Burial Research Notes

White Pine County, Nevada

<u>Note:</u> Donna Frederick compiled a list of deaths at Treasure City and provided this information to Fred Frampton (USFS). Mr. Frampton provided the list to me for this review (see end of document). Some of the names found on Frederick's list are included herein if additional information or news articles were located. Other names on the Frederick list do not appear herein because no further information about them was developed. These names are included on the alphabetical and chronological Excel listings.

(Articles are in Chronological Order)

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 9/20/1867:</u> Nevada. Newark District - ...White Pine District is situated twenty-five miles south of Newark. Several rich ledges have been located and prospected, two of which are owned by J. D. Merchant, who is now building a ten-stamp mill for the reduction of the ore. Furnaces are being built, as the ores are intractable, except by the roasting process. A saw-mill is running at White Pine, which cuts daily 10,000 feet of lumber, and supplies that entire section. Throughout the valley, agricultural prospects are bright, and a finer grazing country never was settled. Mr. Hogan thinks it will take some time to thoroughly develop the resources of that section; but that eventually it will be a worthy integral of flourishing Nevada...

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 6/10/1868:</u> Reese River. – The Reveille of June 5th has the following: ...Since the discovery of the rich deposits of chloride on Treasure Hill, in the district of White Pine, has become generally known, parties have men of left this city (Austin?/ss) daily for that section. The accounts brought and sent to us respecting the extraordinary character of the devolments of the newly found deposits are apparently incredible.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 6/16/1868:</u> Reese River, Nevada. – The Reveille of June 10th has the following items: W. Wakefield returned fro White Point (sic) District to-day with glowing accounts of the rich deposits of Treasure Hill. The town of Hamilton (known a few days ago as Cave City) lies at the base of the hill in view of some of the best locations and the owners of town lots are breathless in expectation of the coming rush of capitalist... He (Wakefield/ss) **predicts that a large camp will be in the vicinity of Treasure Hill before next Fall.** ...

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 7/22/1868:</u> Reese River. – We take these items from the Reveille of July 18th: (Abstract) General A. L. Page proposed to erect a mill in the vicinity of Treasure Hill; it was resolved that Page should erect a mill and take the ores from the mines and work them for \$60 per ton and the miners and mine owners would guarantee him their ores to work.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 8/18/1868:</u> Reese River. – The Austin (Nev.), Reveille of August 14th contains these items of local interest: ... We learn from a letter written by Edward Kiesele at Chloride City, White Pine, on the 12th instant, that a man named **Philip Maguire, better known as "Peg-leg Maguire,"** formerly a resident of this city, was accidentally killed in a mine on that day. He was engaged in blasting, and had lighted the fuse and stepped aside to wait for its explosion, but as it did not occur in the usual time he walked forward to examine the fuse. He had scarcely reached the place when the charge exploded, and fragments of rocks were dashed against his body, wounding him in a frightful

manner. His head and face were shockingly mutilated, his eyes were torn from their sockets, and his chest was severely lacerated. Physicians were soon in attendance, but **after suffering terribly for three or four hours the unfortunate man died**.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 8/27/1868:</u> Belmont, Nevada. – The Champion of August 19th says: By our correspondent at White Pine we are furnished the following account of a fatal accident which occurred in that district last week:

Philip Maguire, a miner, who had formerly lost a leg by a premature explosion in a mine, was killed in White Pine District on Wednesday last, under the following circumstances:

He had charged a hole and applied a match to the fuse. As he did not apparently notice the fuse give the usual "spit" he was stooping down to apply a second match when the blast went off. The discharged rock struck him in the forehead, fracturing the skull and exposing the brain. His face, breast and hands were also terribly disfigured. Although receiving all the attention which Doctors Gordon and Thomas to afford to alleviate his sufferings, he lingered in an insensible condition only a few hours. He was a native of Ireland, and about forty years of age.

<u>Note:</u> Using available information about Mr. Maguire, was unable to locate him by census or in Sacramento by voter registration listings. No further information is known of him. As Mr. Maguire appears not to have had any family and nothing was said about his being taken elsewhere for burial, he is considered a documented burial at Treasure City.

Sacramento Daily Union, 10/5/1868: DIED. In Treasure City (Nev), Sept. 17th, J. F. (sic) Molony, aged 37 years

<u>Note:</u> A gravestone in the Laurel Hill Cemetery, Philadelphia, PA contains multiple Molony family names including Joseph Engle Molony's. On March 10, 2013 I called the cemetery and asked if they had the record of his interment there and upon examining their records they found a note that stated that George Holstein Molony, a half-sibling of Joseph's, and Joseph Engle Molony had been "interred in the West." George died December 10, 1855 at Forest City, Sierra County, California. Joseph Molony is considered to be a documented burial at Treasure City.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 10/17/1868:</u> Letter from White Pine, Nev. (Correspondent of the Union) Treasure City (Nev.), October 8, 1868. White Pine. ...

The Mines are located on Treasure Mountain, covering an extent of five or six miles north and south and about two or three miles east and west...

Treasure City is the town built upon Treasure Mountain, right among the mines, and has been built up within the last two months. At that time there was not house – there were many tents, however – on the hill, and now there are about fifty good substantial buildings, including stores, offices, shops, dwellings and the omnipresent whisky saloons.

The scarcity of building material has alone has prevented the construction of at least as many more buildings the last month; for many people who came here early in the Summer did not like to go to the expense of building, fearing the mines would give out, as so many believed them to be but "pockets" of rich ore, and not well defined ledges....

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 12/9/1868:</u> Needs A Post Office. – The Austin (Nev.) Reveille of December 4th says: White Pine needs greatly a Post Office in each of the three towns of Hamilton, Treasure City and Shermantown. **The population of those towns exceeds in the aggregate a couple of thousand**, an unusual proportion of which is active business men given to domestic and foreign correspondence. This morning there were dispatched from the Post Office in this city by Shannon's Pioneer stage one hundred and forty-two letters, of which seventy-four were for Hamilton, fifty-one for Treasure City, and seventeen for Shermantown. The letters are sent to a storekeeper in either town, at whose place persons expecting letters are wont to call.

Sacramento Daily Union, 1/8/1869: DIED. At Treasure Hill (Nev.), December 28 (1868/ss), Charles Coburn, aged 19 years.

<u>1850</u> Census, Lawrence, Essex County, Massachusetts: Charles Coburn, 35 yrs, Joiner, b. Massachusetts; Abigail Coburn, 45 yrs, b. Maine; Maria L. Coburn, 20 yrs, b. Massachusetts; Mary A. Coburn, 13 yrs, b. Massachusetts; Chas. S. Coburn, 8 yrs, b. Massachusetts

<u>Note:</u> Charles S. Coburn's family remained at Lawrence, MA in 1860 and 1870. In the latter year, there is no census for Charles S. Coburn in Massachusetts, in Essex County or elsewhere or by nationwide search using variable name or initial designations. **Charles Coburn is considered to be a documented burial at Treasure City**.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 1/1/1869:</u> Commissioner of Deeds of California. (appointed during the year 1868) Nevada. A. D. Rock, Treasure City, September 17th.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 1/14/1869:</u> Commissioner of Deeds. – Governor Haight has appointed John Bray, Commissioner of Deeds for Hamilton (Nevada); also Henry M. Morgan, for Treasure City (Nevada).

Sacramento Daily Union, 1/15/1869: DIED. In Treasure Hill, Jan. 6th, J. G. Credit

<u>1860 Census, Auburn, Placer County, California:</u> (Household of George W. McCready, Soda Works) Jason G. Credit, 34 yrs, Soda Works, b. New York

<u>1867 Placer County, California Great Register of Voters:</u> Jason Gillespie Credit, 41 yrs, b. New York, Clerk, Residence-Auburn, Registered-1/7/1867

<u>Daily Alta California, 11/18/1868:</u> A "Preach" at White Pine. The Reese River Reveille of November 10th says: A person who was at Treasure City at the time told us of the following incident of the "preach" given there by the Rev. W. I. Nichols, Pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church in this city, on the Sunday evening preceding the election. It was arranged that the meeting should be held in the **store of Sherman & Credit**...

<u>Note 1:</u> Also in Auburn in 1860 was Isaac W. Credit, b. c. 1823, New York, who was likely a brother of J. G. Credit. Isaac was an Alderman of Austin City, Lander County, in 1867. He was the Lander County Sheriff in 1876. In the 1880 Census Isaac's wife, Isabella M. C. Credit was enumerated at Austin, Lander County as a widow. There is no marked grave in Austin for Isaac Credit or for J. G. Credit in White Pine County or Austin.

<u>Note 2:</u> It is difficult to know if Mr. Credit's remains may have been taken to Austin by his brother. **Recommend he be considered a possible burial at Treasure City** until such time as local area newspapers can be reviewed.

<u>Daily Alta California, 1/19/1869:</u> Letter from White Pine. The Virginia City Enterprise of January 16th says:

We are allowed to make the following extracts from a letter received in this city yesterday by H. M. Eddy, late County Commissioner, from W. W. Bishop, late District Attorney for this county. He says, writing from Treasure City, under date of January 5th: "As to the richness and the extent of these mines..." This is what we call a flaming letter, and we are a little afraid that Mr. Bishop has allowed himself to become excited – he talks as though slightly chlorided.

John White, formerly President of the Miners' Union in this city, writing from Treasure City under date of January 9th, says that they have held a meeting in that place, and organized a society to be known as the **"Miners' Benevolent Association of White Pine,"** which does not differ materially from the Miners' Union of this city... In regard to the health of that place he says: "Our colds, if not properly treated, usually turn into **pneumonia, which in a great many instances thus far have terminated fatally**.

M. A. Johnson, of Gold Hill, formerly a workman in the Crown Point Mine, and a man by the name of Clark, at one time employed about Stevenson's mill, are both lying dangerously ill of the prevailing disease – pneumonia. Strong hopes, however, are entertained for their recovery." Another letter writer says that **there were four deaths at Treasure City on the 9th inst**. The same letter also states that the weather is very severe, and several persons had been badly frozen... Persons anticipating a visit to the new district are cautioned not to do so until Spring.

Daily Alta California, 1/21/1869: White Pine. People Still Flocking Thither...The Health Question.

Colonel Tyson, writing to A. S. Gould, of this city, from Treasure City, under date of January 13th says: ...I see it reported that several cases of **Small Pox** have made their appearance in Sherman, and one of two in Treasure Hill, but I doubt if there is a single case at either place. The people of Hamilton yesterday raised a subscription of \$1,000, to be used toward the **erection of a hospital**. Severe colds, rheumatism – inflammatory or otherwise – sore throats, pneumonia, diphtheria, and all sorts of pulmonary complaints, are as prevalent as ever, and **death from some one of these occurs frequently**, but people are too busy to pay much attention to such trifling occurrences. (full issue saved to White Pine County folder)

<u>Helena (MT) Weekly Herald, 2/4/1869:</u> The first child born in White Pine was christened **"Treasuretta**" by the delighted parents.

<u>Daily Alta California, 2/6/1869:</u> Child of High Birth. (abstract) notes that the **first child born in the White Pine District** "came down on the steamer Washoe"; it is three months old, "and was born in Treasure City on the 2d day of November, 1868. She was named **Theresine Hall**; it says on the family's departure the citizens of Treasure City present them with "silver bars valued at several thousand dollars, as a token of their friendship and esteem."

<u>Daily Alta California, 2/8/1869</u>: White Pine. (extracts) ... There are now **from 4,000 to 5,000 people at least** <u>in the district</u> within an area of four or five miles square... Before August 1st, there will be from twenty to fifty thousand people in the White Pine District and immediate vicinity.

Health of the District. - **Pneumonia, pleurisy and mountain fever** have been quite prevalent of late in White Pine, and **in many instances**, owing to the lack of proper accommodation for the sick, and medical attendance, **prove fatal**. The small-pox, supposed to have been brought from the end of the railroad track, **broke out at Silver Springs a few weeks since**, and Hiram Jones, engineer of the Oasis Mill, a man named Brown and an Indian, died from it. It was reported last week that there was **a case or two at Hamilton**, but the correctness of the report is not vouched for. At last accounts no new cases had occurred at Silver Springs or Treasure City, but the citizens of the three towns, with commendable forethought and liberality, in view of the imminent danger of an epidemic occurring before the long winter is over, raised \$4,000 and a committee consisting of J. W. Garland, of Treasure Hill; Frank Wheeler, of Hamilton; J. C. (sic) Credit, Lucius Moore and C. Greeley, of Silver Spring, who are superintending the **erection of the hospital**. It is **located near Silver Springs**, and will be finished this week. Mr. Garland is Chairman of the Committee... (Note: This may be the Swansea hospital./ss)

<u>Treasure City Cemetery List (D. Frederick)</u>: John Turner, Native of Iowa, d. 18 Feb 1869, Treasure City NV, age: About 25yr, White Pine News, Apr 7, 1869 Page 2, column 2 <u>Note</u>: No additional information located about the death of John Turner. Review of census was not successful in further identification of John Turner. Pending review of the original news account, it is not possible to determine if Mr. Turner is more than a possible burial at Treasure City.

Sacramento Daily Union, 2/18/1869: White Pine Items. We take the following local intelligence from the News of February 6th: ... We were yesterday shown a silver brick, a present from G. W. Hodge (who evidently wishes to encourage the increase of population of this place) to **Treasure E. Hall**, the **first born of Treasure City**.

<u>Daily Alta California, 2/20/1869:</u> Matters at White Pine. The annexed account of matters at White Pine is taken from the Virginia Enterprise of February 18th: Alexander Coryell, of this city, who returned from White Pine day before yesterday, says that when he left there was about four feet of snow in Treasure City, with plenty more coming down... At the time Coryell left, which was in the midst of the late storm, there was **much sickness in the several towns – principally pneumonia and rheumatic disorders**. Captain Sam. Curtis, George Birdsall and Paul Coppers were all confined to their rooms with rheumatism and many others were limping about with the same complaint. The climate of Treasure City is cold and foggy, and therefore very bad for those subject to rheumatic attacks.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 2/27/1869</u>: Cold Weather at White Pine – A Man Frozen. – We learned from Henry VanWinkle, who arrived here this morning from White Pine, that the weather was intensely cold there during Saturday and Sunday. At eleven o'clock in the morning of the latter day the mercury stood at 11° below zero at Hamilton and 15° below at Treasure City. On Sunday evening **a man**, whose name VanWinkle did not learn, but who was employed formerly in a butcher shop in this city, was frozen under the following circumstances: He was running a sleigh for passengers between Hamilton and Treasure City, and during Sunday he drank to excess. He left Hamilton in the afternoon without any passengers, and it is supposed that he fell asleep and froze. The team took the sleigh to Treasure City, in which the driver was found stiff and cold. – Austin (Nev.) Reveille, February 23d.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 3/3/1869:</u> Not Frozen. – It is **contradicted that a man recently froze stiff and dead** on the road between Hamilton and Treasure City (Nev.), in the White Pine district.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 3/1/1869:</u> From White Pine. - A correspondent of the Virginia Enterprise, writing from Treasure City, February 21st, discourses as follows:

This has been the coldest day of the season, so far; colder yet coming, I expect. Thermometer variously reported at from 9 to 16 degrees below zero, Farenheit (sic), this morning. At eleven a.m. it stood 1 degree above zero. Few people seen in the streets. Several frost-bitten cases reported - noses,

ears and fingers. It is reported here on the streets, **with what truth I cannot say**, that **three persons were found on the trail to Shermantown or Silver Springs badly frozen**, and taken to the latter place, and that **two of them died soon after arrival**. One man had his ears frozen coming up in the sleigh from Hamilton this morning. Another luckless wight was notice carelessly wending his way along Main street this afternoon with ears white as chalk - the infallible mark of the frost king. His attention being called to the fact, he resorted to the usual remedy, rubbing them with snow, but don't know how he came out. A moderate breeze is blowing, and the remark has been made a hundred time this afternoon, "some one goes in to-night, sure." Men will crowd in, notwithstanding all warnings, and take all chances of insufficient food, shelter and clothing; but they pay for it dearly. Those who contemplate coming here should not depend on transient reports of fine weather, warm days, men working in their shirt sleeves in the open air, and all that. Three days ago it was very pleasant, and may be again in three days more, but in the meantime much suffering has ensued.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 3/3/1869:</u> A Man Shot at White Pine. – We learned from Marshal Dumars, who returned from White Pine this morning, says the Austin (Nev.) Reveille, of February 27th, that a shooting occurred at Treasure City sometime after midnight on Thursday, in which a man named **John Marcuse** killed another man named **James Bryan**. The men had a difficulty about a woman at the same place on the 29th of January last, when several shots were exchanged without injury to the parties. Marcuse formerly resided in this city.

<u>Treasure Hill (Jackson, 1963), p. 65-66:</u> The first death by violence occurred at Treasure City the last week of February, 1869. Two men seated at a table in the Mammoth saloon started a quarrel, challenged each other to a fist fight, and headed for the door. The man in the forefront ascended the stairs to the street and turned as his opponent stepped on the stairs and fired upon him, the ball striking the right breast near the waist and coming out at the loins. The murderer fled to Shermantown where he purchased a horse and left the district... (The Flourishing; Lawlessness; Footnote 150 – White Pine News, 4/12, 5/6, 12, 19 and 6/4/1869)

<u>Note:</u> Without further information about Mr. Bryan's nativity or age, it is difficult to locate additional information about him. An Edward Bryan (b. c. 1841) was enumerated at Treasure City on the 1870 Census. There is no way, however, to determine if James Bryan may have been related to either of them. It may be that additional information will be available in an article from the local newspapers. **Mr. Bryan should be considered a possible burial at Treasure City**.

<u>Treasure Hill (Jackson, 1963), p. 66:</u> The community continued to be shocked by periodic **murders** through the fall and winter of 1869. **Before the year was out ten men had lost their lives**.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 3/5/1869:</u> Letter from White Pine. (Correspondence of the Virginia Enterprise) Treasure City (Nev.), February 25, 1869. ... A great many Gold Hillers hang out at Hamilton. George Birdsall lies prostrate there of inflammatory rheumatism, but is improving. I also saw **Mrs. Tom Hannah** there – rather a healthy looking corpse. **You have had her dead in the Enterprise**... Improvements. This place is growing rapidly, as is also the other towns in the district. The population of Treasure City will perhaps not fall short of 6,000.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 3/9/1869:</u> A Murdered Man in White Pine. – A correspondent of the Virginia Enterprise, writing from Treasure City, White Pine, under date of March 1st, says that on the 28th of February a young man was killed and robbed within a few miles of that place. From papers found on his person it was thought that he came from San Francisco, where it is said he carried on business as a picture dealer. He has also been engaged for a time as a trader in general merchandise on the line of the Central Pacific Railroad. From papers found with him, and by persons who have recognized his

features, his name was ascertained to have been **T. Francis Lawton**. It is judged from the appearance of the ground where he was found that a most tremendous struggle must have occurred before he was finally killed, showing that he fought bravely for his life. The correspondent does not say whether the young man was shot, stabbed or beaten to death.

Sacramento Daily Union, 3/29/1869: From White Pine. The White Pine correspondent to the Alta, writing from Treasure City, March 21st, says: ...The report published in the Enterprise recently of the murder of a book peddler near this place, after a severe struggle, was a vile *canard*, probably started by the man who ought to have been murdered, but was not. (Note: This was speaking of the report on **T**. **Francis Lawton**/ss)

<u>Daily Alta California, 3/18/1869:</u> Letter from White Pine. (Special Correspondence of the Alta California) Treasure City, March 13th, 1869. - Editors Alta: Yesterday there was hardly any snow left on the ground on Treasure Hill...**David Youngblood**, formerly of Virginia City, died here of pneumonia on the 8th, and two more cases, which are likely to prove fatal, are reported.

Sacramento Daily Union, 3/22/1869: DIED. In Treasure City (Nev.), March 8th, David Youngblood

<u>Daily Alta California, 3/20/1869:</u> Nevada. The following items are from the Territorial Enterprise of March 18th: ... **Two or three cases of small-pox are reported at Hamilton**, White Pine, and **one in Treasure City**. There is also much pneumonia and rheumatism in both towns.

Sacramento Daily Union, 3/31/1869: DIED. In Treasure City (Nev.), March 23d, Truman Erwin, aged 36 years.

<u>Note:</u> No Truman Erwin or Irwin was found in Nevada or California. A "T. Erwin" (27 yrs, Teamster, b. Connecticut) was enumerated at Newtown, Diamond Springs Township, El Dorado County, California on the 1860 Census. As no place of nativity was given in the death notice, it is not possible to say if the El Dorado Erwin is the same man. A Truman Erwin was enumerated at New Milford, Litchfield County, Connecticut on the 1850 Census, who was 16 years old in that year. That Truman Erwin was not found in Connecticut in 1860 or in California after the 1860 Census. Mr. Erwin should be considered a possible burial pending review of potential local area newspapers.

<u>Treasure City Cemetery List (D. Frederick)</u>: Clarke, Captain Charles D., Native of Lancaster Ohio, d. 29 Mar 1869, Treasure City NV, age: 27yr, White Pine News Apr 5, 1869 Page 2 column 1 and column 5

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 7/28/1868:</u> Commissioned in Nevada. – Charles D. Clarke has been commissioned, by Governor Blasdel, as Aid-de-Camp, with the rank of Captain on the staff of Adjutant General C. N. Noteware...

<u>Note:</u> No further information found about Charles Clarke. No additional death notice found published in California newspapers or through available nationwide historical newspapers online. Pending review of local area newspapers, **Captain Clarke should be considered to be a possible burial at Treasure City**.

<u>Daily Alta California, 4/2/1869:</u> Letter from White Pine.(From an Occasional Correspondent of the Alta) Treasure City, March 27th, 1869. ...The storm was very severe, and numerous cases of illness have been the result of exposure. We have **a few cases of small-pox**, but nothing alarming.

***<u>The Montana Post (Virginia City, MT), 4/2/1869</u>: The West. It is reported that in a free fight of a lot of roughs in Treasure City, White Pine, Jo. Coburn, the noted pugilist, was lately fatally shot.

<u>Treasure City Cemetery List (D. Frederick)</u>: **Pat. Hefferman,** Native of Ireland, d. 6 Apr 1869, Treasure City NV, White Pine News Apr 7, 1869 Page 2, column 4 (Possible Match) 1860 Census, Jamestown, Township 3, Amador County, California: Patrick Heffeman, 27 yrs, Miner,

b. Ireland

<u>Note:</u> No other definitive information about a Pat. or Patrick Hefferman living in California or Nevada was found. No age was given on the Frederick list and the presumption is that the White Pine News did not provide an age. Review of the local newspaper is recommended. If he was not connected with kin or family, as he was not in 1860, **Mr. Hefferman should be considered to be a probable burial at Treasure City**.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 4/7/1869:</u> Experience at White Pine. – The Grass Valley Union of April 6th, has the annexed: James Patterson received a letter yesterday from our late townsman, E. McSorley, dated on the 1st instant at Treasure City. ... There are now **nine cases of small pox** in one house on Main street, right in the principal part of town. People are going in and out of the house every day, and mixing among the people in the crowded saloons every night; so that if it is true that the disease is contagious, it would not surprise me if one-half the population would take it; and in this country it would prove fatal in almost every instance, on account of the scarcity of accommodations.

<u>Daily Alta California, 4/16/1869:</u> Letter from White Pine. (Special Correspondence of the Alta California) Treasure City, April 10th, 1869. Editors Alta: ...The Eberhardt. ...I went down to the Eberhardt again yesterday, for the express purpose of seeing what there was in the lower level, and was courteously permitted to go through every part of the mine by **Captain Frank Drake**, one of the proprietors, who was there at the time, and the Superintendent, John Bicknell, who showed me all that was being done....

<u>Daily Alta California, 5/6/1869</u>: Letter from White Pine. (Special Correspondence of the Alta California) Treasure City, May 1st, 1869. Editors Alta: ...Death Strikes A Shining Mark. Among those who have recently succumbed to the rigors of this climate and gone down to untimely graves, I know of none more widely regretted and mourned that **Richard Poston**, a graduate of the College at Oakland last year, a young man of great promise, with such sterling qualities of mind and heart as commended him to the admiration and esteemed of all who met him. He came here only a few weeks since in the vigorous health of early manhood, was stricken down with fever, lingered two weeks, and sank away to his rest at last as peacefully as an infant to its slumbers. Loving hands wrapped him in the garments of the grave and laid him gently in his coffin, and as the prayer for the widowed and, now doubly bereaved mother, whose pride and stay in life he was, went up from the midst of the little throng of mourners, tears flowed from many eyes, albeit unused to weep. His mother, who had started from Marysville on being informed of the serious illness of her son, was notified of his death at Elko, and carried fainting from the cars to a hotel **to await the arrival of his remains**.

His arm and leg are broken and he has severe injuries about the head. (Note: F. Frampton advises he believes Chloride Flat is next to Treasure City./ss)

<u>Note:</u> Have been unable to identify Abraham Elliott by census and with no age given, it is more difficult. He was likely a native of Cornwall, England, since the information from D. Frederick indicates there was a "Cornish funeral ceremony." The 1870 Census enumerations listed four people with the surname of Elliott:

1) James Elliott was a Treasure City and was a 45 year old native of England, He was a miner.; 2) Lydia B. Elliott was living in the Hamilton household of William W. Hobert (35 yrs, b. Michigan). Lydia Elliott was a 69 years old native of Massachusetts. Hobert's daughter was named Lydia, leading to the suspicion that William Hobert was her son-in-law. In 1880, Lydia Elliott was living with two daughters in the Bay area of California, one of whom was Minnie Hobart. Tracking Lydia to earlier censuses found that Lydia's husband was not Abraham Elliott.; 3) George B. Elliott, a stock herder, was living at Hamilton, also. He was a 51 year old native of New York.; and 4) Charles F. Elliott was living in the household of miner Patrick Conway at Shermantown. Charles Elliott worked in a quartz mill and was a 27 year old native of Canada.

From this review, if Abraham Elliott was from England, then the likely family connection, if any there was, would have been with James Elliott, of Treasure City.

Other than the above, without knowing his age at the time of his death, nothing further may be determined about Abraham Elliott.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 6/25/1869:</u> From White Pine, Nevada – Severe Thunder Storm. Treasure City, June 25th. ...This city was visited by a severe thunder storm yesterday afternoon, accompanied by light showers.

A man named **Charles B. Lutherson**, a native of Denmark, aged about forty-three, was instantly killed by lightning. His partner, Geo. Smith, was knocked down, his whiskers and hair burned, his coat tail ripped off, but he was not seriously injured.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 5/30/1881:</u> Pacific Coast Items. A Chinaman was killed by lightning near Carson a few days since, being literally split in halves, says the Bodie Free Press. This is the second person killed (by lightning?/ss) in Nevada since the admission of that State. A miner was "instantly killed near the highest peak of Treasure Hill, White Pine county, in 1869.

considered a possible burial and it is recommended that the local newspaper be reviewed for further details.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 7/7/1869:</u> Postmaster Appointed. C. F. Myers, of the firm of Halleck & Myers, has been appointed Postmaster of Treasure City (Nev.) The **name of the office has been changed from Tesoro to Treasure City**.

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 7/8/1869:</u> Casualty at White Pine (Nev.) - A dispatch dated at Treasure City (Nev.), July 6th, has the annexed: An Irishman named **Daniel Lyons**, aged 25 years, fell twenty-five feet into a spelter shaft at six o'clock this afternoon, fracturing his skull. **He will probably die**...

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 7/8/1869:</u> From White Pine (Nev.) - A dispatch from Treasure City, July 8th, has the annexed: ... **Daniel Lyons**, who fell down the spelter shaft on Tuesday night, **died of his injuries yesterday**.

On Saturday last Thomas Forsythe shot and it is supposed mortally wounded _____ Moyle, of Spring valley, ten miles south of the Newark mill. The difficulty grew out of a dispute about some hay, and from all the circumstances it appears that Forsythe was entirely justifiable for his action in the premises. Moyle had pressed him with a six-shooter, cocked, for some time, when Forsythe told him if he advanced another step he would kill him, by this time having got hold of a shot-gun. The warning was not heeded, and Forsythe leveled and discharged his gun, the shot taking effect in the region of the left eye and tearing away nearly half of Moyle's head. The wound will undoubtedly prove fatal, but at latest accounts the injured man was still alive. Forsythe, after harnessing up his team and taking Moyle to his home, came to this city (Hamilton/ss) and gave himself up to the officers. He was allowed to go on his own recognizance, until the result of Moyle's injury is known, after which, we presume, he will have an examination.

<u>Note 2:</u> This entry requires further research to identify the deceased and to more accurately identify the place of death and whether the body was taken somewhere for burial. This man is not listed by D. Frederick on her listing from her review of the White Pine News.

Mary died in 1869, Gustavus Jr. died in 1875, in Missouri. As this is where Georgia was born, it may be that Lucy had another child after Mary and before Georgia, and that she felt she should go home for visit during her grief. In the same token, the two children on the 1900 Census are inconsistent in that they would make a total of six children in addition to William, Alexander, George and Frances, who were enumerated in the family in 1880.

Because it is uncertain if Peter and Frances Harrison may have been her parents, whoever her parents were may have taken her elsewhere for burial or have had her buried at Treasure City. Without reviewing a local account of her death, **Gussie should be considered a possible burial**. She may also have been buried in the Hamilton Cemetery if the family believed that Treasure City was on the wane.

<u>Nevada State Journal, 2/4/1911:</u> Will Attacked, Fight Expected. Ely Case Where Women Are Battling for Share of Estate of John Wearne.

Ely, nev., Feb. 1 - Mrs. Johanna T. Wearne of Cherry Creek filed a petition in the district court yesterday asking that the summons in suit started by Philippa Wearne Boyd to break the will of the late John Wearne be declared void because it had been issued without authority of law.

This is said to show the determination on the part of Mrs. Wearne to fight to the bitter end any attempt on the part of her adopted daughter to obtain one-half of the fortune left by her husband, John Wearne.

The defendant attacked the validity of the complain in a general demurrer which was filed in the clerk's office.

In connection with the beginning of the struggle for a portion of the estate was the filing of a deed in the recorder's office yesterday from Johanna T. Wearne to May Widaksy of the firm of A. Josephs & Co., now in control of the Fair store in this city.

According to the provisions of the document Mrs. Wearne has sold all the merchandise and movable fixtures in the Carlson hall at Cherry Creek where her husband conducted a store many years for \$2800.

Owing to the present ation Widasky was compelled to deposit \$1100 in the hands of County Clerk Oldfield pending a decision in the matter.

The original complaint of Phillipa Boyd, who was cut off in the will of her foster parent with a legacy of only \$5, claims that, during an illness of over a year prior to his death, Mr. Wearne was unduly influenced by his wife in the disposition of the property.

<u>Note 1:</u> It is unclear whether John H. Warren and John Wearne are the same man. Certainly the name of the wives, Johanna, and her birthplace, Germany, are the same, leaving the impression that the 1870 Census spelling of the surname was in error. The question arises as to what may have happened to Emma J. Warren, the surviving child after Alexandria's death. She is not found on the 1875 or 1880 census. She would have been of a marriageable age by 1880, but not in 1875.

<u>Note 2:</u> Alexandria Warren is considered a probable burial pending review of local area newspapers at the time of her death.

<u>Daily Alta California, 3/12/1870:</u> White Pine. Hamilton, March 11th. – A man named **Cyrus Sheldon**, a native of New York, aged about thirty-four was found dead in Treasure City, night before last. The cause of his death was compression of the brain, caused by a blow or fall yesterday.

Currie, an auctioneer at Virginia City, lost \$75,000 in merchandise in a massive fire that started in a house owned by Kate Shay, alias Crazy Kate, a woman of ill repute. No graves for the parents are found in Nevada or California. Sarah Currie Hallock was taken to Virginia City where she was buried in what are today called the Silver Terrace cemeteries.

<u>Note 1:</u> Mother's name was **Sallie S.**, not Sallies. "Saly S. Drake" found as wife of **Oliver Drake** on the 1880 Census residing at Eberhardt, White Pine County, Nevada. Oliver Drake married Sallie S. Knowlton in Boston, Massachusetts, August 19, 1862./ss Oliver Drake appointed Postmaster of Eberhardt, Nevada on April 4, 1881 and served until July 1886. Sallie S. Knowlton Drake died August 19, 1889. Oliver Drake died Mar. 18, 1908. They are buried in the Edgerly-Knowlton Cemetery in Chichester, Merrimack County, New Hampshire. Sallie's parents, Hosea and Betsey Knowlton are also buried there.

There seems to be considerable indignation concerning the matter, and Drake is generally censured for his neglect in running so far behind a paying basis.

<u>Note 2:</u> White Pine News, 6/16/1883: "Mrs. Drake, **wife of Capt. (Frank/ss) Drake** of Eberhardt, has arrived from the East. **This is the lady's first visit to Nevada**."

The above statement secures that Lillie Treasure Drake is the daughter of Oliver Drake and not Frank Drake.

<u>Note 3:</u> Donna Frederick noted that all she found at the Treasure City cemetery was a sandstone marker with the initials "J. T. D." inscribed in it. In the background of the above photo is a footstone for the

grave of Lillie Treasure Drake. It is possible that Ms. Frederick misread the inscription and that the small sandstone marker with the initials may read "L. T. D." instead of "J. T. D."

Sacramento Daily Union, 3/18/1872: DIED. In Treasure City (Nev), February 25th, Peter Stevens, aged 32 years.

<u>Note:</u> No information was found about Peter Stevens under either Stevens or Stephens. **Mr. Stevens is** considered to be a possible burial pending further review of local area newspapers.

<u>Nevada State Journal, 12/21/1872:</u> THE TOMB. BENNETT – In Treasure City, Dec. 11, 1872, Geo. Bennett, aged 44 years.

<u>Nevada State Journal , 12/21/1872:</u> Nevada State News. On Wednesday last, says the White Pine News of December 14, **George Bennett**, foreman of the Noonday mine, while engaged in his duties fell down the Burns shaft adjoining the mine, about 100 foot in depth. The unfortunate man was drawn up alive, but **his injuries terminated fatally on Thursday**.

<u>From http://files.usgwarchives.net/nv/clark/vitals/deaths/nvdeaths-b.txt</u>: George Bennett; d. 12/11/1872, at Treasure City; 44 years; County-Lincoln; Source-Nevada State Journal, no date given (Note: This is probably derived from the above articles from the Nevada State Journal.)

<u>Note:</u> A 28 year old George Bennett was enumerated at Treasure City on the 1870 Census. That George Bennett worked at a sawmill. That man was probably not the man who was killed at the Noonday mine as the age difference is too disparate. A George Bennett, aged 31 years was residing at Hamilton in 1870 and worked at an ore smelter. This George Bennett was a native of England, but, again, the age difference cannot be ignored.

Without knowing a purported place of birth, it is not possible to further identify George Bennett or whether there was any family at Treasure City that may have been associated with him and, therefore, he **should be considered a possible burial**.

<u>White Pine News, 6/15/1869</u>: Local Intelligence. Mining Suit. For the past few days the case of Hidden Treasure vs. the **Rathbun Silver Mining Company**, has created considerable talk on the streets, and as various rumors are afloat relative thereto, we deem it our duty to give the facts. The Hidden Treasure was the first location on Treasure Hill, but the locators failed to comply with the mining laws in not having their claim recorded in time. The locators of the Rathbun mine, knowing this, lapped their

location over a portion of the Hidden Treasure claim, and had it recorded first. Of course, the Rathbun's now claim so much of the Hidden Treasure ground as was located and recorded by them, but the latter company, being in possession, has brought suit against the Rathbun to quiet title.

<u>Note 1:</u> It does not appear that "Mrs. E. M. Rathbon" was the wife of either Erskine Rathbun or his brother Edwin. I have contacted Edward Kipp who posted family group records to the World Connect Project to see if she is even related to the Rathbun family at all. One of Erskine and Edwin's uncles married a second time to an "Elizabeth," but Mr. Kipp provided no middle initial for her. Perhaps he may have encountered the mysterious "Mrs. E. M. Rathbon."

<u>Note 2:</u> Response from Rathbun descendants did not reveal a known association with the Erskine and Edwin Rathbun family. **"Mrs. E. M. Rathbon" should be considered a possible burial** pending review of local area newspapers.

Sacramento Daily Union, 5/8/1873: DIED. Treasure City, April 30 – M. Cashan, 28 years

<u>Note:</u> No information about M. Cashan was developed. Without a birthplace for him/her, it would be difficult to define an identity. **M. Cashan should be considered to be a probable burial at Treasure City.**

Sacramento Daily Union, 1/20/1873: BORN. At Treasure Hill, Nev., January 6, the wife of Robert Cheshire, of a son. (1900 Census this is L. L. Cheshire, living Oregon Township, Butte County, California./ss)

Sacramento Daily Union, 7/17/1874: BORN. Treasure Hill, July 9 – Wife of Robert Cheshire, a daughter

Note: Robert Cheshire married Isabella B. Lee, at Nicolaus, Sutter Co., CA on 11/29/1857. (Vol A, p. 38.)

The family was enumerated at Nicolaus P.O., Vernon Township, Sutter Co., California on the 1860 census. The Cheshire household (listed as "Creshin") included "R. Creshin," 30 yrs, Farmer, RE \$1500/PE \$1000, b. Kentucky; Isabella Creshin, 21 yrs, Domestic, b. Illinois; Thomas Creshin, 1 yrs, b. California; and, H. Stockton, 24 yrs, Farm hand, b. Illinois.

Twin sons were born to the Cheshire's at Austin, Nevada in March of 1866. They later died in October, 1866. (Sacramento Daily Union, 3/22/1866)

The 1875 Nevada State Census enumerated "R. Cheshire" and family in White Pine County. Family included R. Cheshire (46 yrs, Blacksmith, Kentucky) I. B. Cheshire (female, 36 yrs, Illinois), T. L. Cheshire (male, 16 yrs, Miner, California), G. R. Cheshire (male, 14 yrs, California), N. Cheshire (female, 7 yrs, Nevada), J. Cheshire (female, 5 yrs, Nevada), L. L. Cheshire (male, 2 yrs, Nevada). The youngest child in the household who was enumerated in 1875 was son, "L. L. Cheshire."

On the 1880 Census at "New Town" in Eureka County, Nevada, there is **no child born in 1874** in the Cheshire household. Another daughter, "Lavini", born 1876 (4 yrs, Nevada), was in the household. "T. L. Cheshire" not in household. Son Thomas L. Cheshire (T. L. Cheshire) was enumerated at Spring City, Humboldt County, Nevada in 1880, a 21 year old miner, born California.

In June 1884, Mrs. R. Cheshire and six children arrived in San Francisco from Ruby Hill, Nevada.

See Find A Grave for **Thomas L. Cheshire**, died Deadwood, South Dakota, October 1886. He was killed by the explosion of giant powder at the Caledonia mine, near Deadwood. The age on the gravestone is right for Thomas, who was born in 1859, but not confirmed and the news article does not state where the killed men were from.

In 1900, Robert Cheshire has deceased and wife, Isabelle Cheshire is in Oregon Township, Butte County, California. Isabelle Cheshire stated she'd **given birth to 14 children, of whom only 5 children were then living**. It does not appear that the daughter born in 1874 survived. Per the Sacramento Daily Union of 4/20/1869, Robert Cheshire was a blacksmith at the North Aurora mine. The gravestone of daughter, Lavina Cheshire is located in the Cherokee Cemetery in Butte County, California. (Note: Have made contact with descendant of Lavinia. She says the daughter born in July 1874 was named either Lily or Isabelle. /ss)

<u>Email via Ancestry.com</u>, <u>Sue Silver & Lisette</u>, <u>Cheshire descendant</u>: In answer to S. Silver question as to the identities of other deceased children of Robert and Isabelle, she replied:

"There are possibly others. It helps to know that Isabella returned to California in 1884, but did it say if Robert came too? If you could let me know where you learned the return information I would appreciate that. I don't know exactly when they went to Nevada so that makes some of these children that died possibly die in Nevada or California. I can't find this family in the 1870 census which would have helped. I know they were somewhere in Nevada in Sept 1867 because a child who lived until 1944 said she was born in Nevada. Thank goodness for the Nevada 1875 census. Here are those that **died before June 1884**:

Anna Lee born in 1861 death date unknown.

Unknown Baby girl born in 1863 death date unknown. Believe her name may have been Jessie.

A second girl born in 1870 in Nevada who died in 1886 in California was also named Jessie. I believe there were two Jessie's because in the family plot in Butte County they put name markers for their children that died before Isabelle did in the plot and there are two stones with the name Jessie.

Twin boys Charles and Albert born March 1866 and died October 1866

Lilly (or Isabell) born July 9, 1874 and died Aug 8, 1874

Mary (or Mable) born Jan 25, 1883 and died Feb 18, 1883

Unfortunately I can't take these names to the bank as they are handed down through the family and I have been unable to confirm them. Sorry


I can confirm that L. L. Cheshire was **Louis Leonard Cheshire** who died in 1922 in Butte County CA. Also a blacksmith like his father. Also the **Lavini is my great grandmother Lavinia Treasure Cheshire born near Treasure City Dec 18, 1875** and died in 1958 in San Joaquin County CA. (I lived in Butte County for years and have pictures of all the headstones up to 2001.)

<u>Nevada State Journal, 5/20/1874:</u> State Items in Brief. The *Elevator* is the name of a new daily, published at Treasure City, White Pine county. The terms of subscription - \$37.50 per annum, or \$1.00 per week – are considerably "elevated" we think

<u>Sacramento Daily Union, 5/18/1875:</u> Accidents at White Pine. – The News of May 16th, records these accidents:

Just as we go to press, we learn that **James Brown**, one of the man employed at the Eberhardt & Aurora Company's mill, at Eberhardt City, was this morning (Friday) caught in the machinery and instantly killed. We could not learn the particulars. Coroner Meyers has been summoned, and will hold an inquest at once.

Fred Elliott....(accident, rock hit head and crushed thumb making amputation necessary; patient is doing fine/ss)

<u>Treasure City Cemetery List (D. Frederick):</u> James Brown, d. 14 May 1875, Eberhardt & Aurora Company Mill, Eberhardt, Mill accident, Masonic funeral, White Pine News May 15, 1875 Page 1 column 1. May 22, 1875 page 2, column and 3 page 3, column 2

<u>Note:</u> Frederick mentions the **Masonic funeral but doe not state which cemetery**. As his father died at Treasure City the following month, he **probably would have had James buried at Treasure City**.

<u>Treasure City Cemetery List (D. Frederick)</u>: **A. J. Brown**, d. 12 Jun 1865, Treasure City NV, Typhoid fever, Father of James Brown below (above/ss), White Pine News Jun 12, 1875 Page 2 column 4 and page 3 column 1 (Note: Frederick's list is in alphabetical order, hence the notation of "James Brown below"./ss)

<u>Note:</u> Neither A. J. Brown or his son, James, was found in White Pine County on the 1870 Census. Since it is certain that James Brown was buried in a Masonic funeral, it is almost certain his father would have been buried near him. **A. J. Brown is considered to be a documented burial.**

Sacramento Daily Union, 6/18/1875: Nevada Items. Scarlet fever still prevails to some extent at Hamilton and Treasure City, but up to the 12th instant no death had occurred from the disease. (Note: Perhaps A. J. Brown died after the paper went to press?/ss)

<u>Nevada State Journal, 2/1/1879:</u> Nevada State Legislature. ...Assembly bill to disincorporate Treasure City. Read third time and passed.

<u>White Pine News, 6/5/1886</u>: Hamilton Notes. (dated 6/2/1886) Treasure Hill is getting to be quite a place again. Sam Sing has opened another restaurant up there in the old Karbstein building.

Sausalito News, 11/26/1886: The population of Treasure Hill, White Pine county, Nev., has dwindled to twenty.

From Ely, the present county seat of White Pine County, take U.S. 50 west for 37 miles. Exit left and follow the road that shows the most travel nine (9) miles into Hamilton. To this point, the road is easily navigated by a passenger car but from Hamilton 4-wheel drive is required. I recommend contacting the Forest Service before going in.

Treasure City is located about 1½ miles southeast of the former county seat of White Pine County, Hamilton. It is located in the Humboldt National Forest. There are many roads in this area and none of them are marked or maintained. It is a mixture of privately owned, and government managed land. The elevation is approximately 9,000 ft.

The cemetery is located on a hill above the road about 1/2 mile before Treasure City with no markings and nothing visible from the road. There is only one sandstone marker, that appears to be one placed at the foot of a grave with the initials J.T.D. engraved on it. That is obviously a J - and as you will see by my list of names - I found no J.T.D.! There are numerous rock ruins at Treasure City.

The town was originally named Tesora and a post office with that name opened on April 23, 1869. On Jun 15, 1869 the name was officially changed to Treasure City. The town was at it's peak from 1869 through 1870. Treasure City was abandoned for all practical purposed by 1878, but there were still single miner's cabins with inhabitants.

I spent over a year acquiring the data for this cemetery from old newspaper articles. The courthouse burned in January 1885 and all records were lost. Nothing remains at the cemetery but a few fallen palings. I know there are more buried in this cemetery than I have found. I welcome any information someone might be willing to share with me.

The latest burial I found was Freethy in 1879. From the letter I received concerning him, it appeared he was doing contract work with several others but were having a rough time of it. Cemetery can probably be dated from 1869 through 1880.
